



We were greeted by Morwenna Smart who gave us an excellent talk and showed videos on the work of the Air Ambulance. This was followed by a visit to the hanger where we were able to see the new helicopter and a female pilot (the only female pilot) who told us of all the equipment on board including a new ultrasound machine which is fast, non-invasive and a way to help identify serious injuries and help with complex medical procedures. Although the new AW169 helicopter is larger than the previous one, there didn't seem a lot of room for two paramedics, a doctor and a patient!

Suddenly all the bells and whistles went off and it was a shout! We had to hurry back inside and were then able to witness the helicopter being taken out and the pilot and paramedics dashing on board – a real demonstration of their work. The Air Ambulance is funded totally by donations. An excellent donation was made by our members.

# BIRD'S EYE VIEW – by Andrew Nicholson EGRET EXTRAVAGANZA!

Egrets are part of the Heron family and are immediately identifiable by their pure snowy white plumage. There was a time when all species of Egret were regarded as real rarities in Britain, but times have changed and distributions are changing in response to climate changes. Over the last thirty years, Little Egrets have become an increasingly common site in Cornwall and now every estuary system across the county will have small numbers of Little Egrets, pretty much year round, including the Tresillian River. They have expanded their range moving up from the continent and in aopposite the Heron Inn in Malpas each year. If you walk along the river you will always see one or two, sometimes maybe seven or eight on a good day. If you get to see one quite close up, you will notice their bright yellow feet and how they often waggle one of their feet to disturb small creatures from the bed of a river channel. They also have a noticeable white crest and additional plumes in the breeding season which made them a target for hunters in Victorian times who used their plumes for hat decorations. Thankfully, most people now realise they look a lot better on the birds.

In the last five or six years, Cattle Egret can sometimes be seen in the Tresillian area too. As the name suggests, they are quite often seen in fields where cows are grazing and are attracted to feeding on insects in piles of dung! Sometimes they are found along the river, particularly near dusk where they will often wait a while before roosting in near by trees. They are sociable birds, and are more often seen in small flocks than Little Egrets. Occasionally larger flocks assemble, and a couple of winters ago there was a peak count of 40 birds one day in the field next to Tresemple Pool. The first ones for this year were seen on the Tresillian River on the 6<sup>th</sup> November. They are a similar size to Little Egrets but tend to be hunched up a lot more and walk in a rather more jerky way. They don't have yellow feet and some (especially towards the breeding season) have a buff crown on the top of their heads and have pale, yellowish bills rather than the black of the Little Egret (except for juvenile birds).

The final European Egret is the Great White Egret - a mighty looking bird, standing around a metre high and almost twice the size of a Little and Cattle Egret - as large as a Grey Heron in fact. These too have been seen more regularly in recent years in Britain as birds have come over from the continent (a few now breed on the Somerset levels), but they are still pretty scarce birds in Cornwall. So it was a great sight to see one taking up residence for a few days at Tresemple Pool in November, the first time I have seen a Great White Egret on "our" river. This adult bird has a powerful bright yellow bill and was an impressive sight strutting around the pool and flying from one side to the other with a wingspan in excess of one and a half metres. So, keep an eye out and see what Egrets you might see the next time you walk along the river.

## **Obituaries**

Margaret Brown 25th August 1935 – 22nd November 2023

We are sad to announce the death of Margaret Brown, of Higher Polsue Way, Tresillian, who died aged 88 years in Treliske Hospital on the 22nd of November 2023.

Margaret was a much loved resident of the village who moved here with her two children, Suzanne and Robert, from Praa Sands in 1975. She was always happy to chat with anyone passing by her door, always accompanied by her little and much adored dog, Tilly. She loved popping out in her car to visit friends and family, have her hair and nails done, pop up to Waitrose for a cup of tea, or to Marks and Sparks to buy a new jumper.

She was always smartly dressed and according to her children had a wicked sense of humour! Margaret suffered from ill health in recent years but didn't let this affect her, continuing to enjoy life almost to the end.

Margaret was born in Islington, London. Her father, a fireman, was killed during the Blitz when she was only five years old. Margaret was evacuated from London during the war and shipped off to Portscatho to stay with Grandparents. Margaret returned to London at the end of the war but her Mother died only a few years later. The orphaned young Margaret was then, along with her little sister Julia, adopted by her Portscatho grandparents, thus beginning her Cornish adventures.

Margaret started her working life in Barclays Bank when she was sixteen years old living with two elderly ladies in lodgings in Falmouth. At the weekends she would travel back to Porthscatho by bus, ferry or her granddad's boat.

She was married in 1958 to Michael Brown, a Lieutenant in the British Navy, and after living in Malta for a short time, she returned to Cornwall where she had her two children and would spend the rest of her days. While living in Tresillian she retrained as a secretary and worked as a bookkeeper for several companies.

Margaret is survived by Robert and Suzanne, six grandchildren and two great grandchildren and will be much missed by all.

Margaret's friends Geoff and Claudia Jones are looking after Tilly.

### **Tresillian Allotment Association**

**S**now is falling, all around me, children playing, having fun, is the season for love and understanding, Merry Christmas everyone.

This well known festive song is playing on the radio, while in reality I am sitting in my armchair, a mug of coffee in one hand and a choccy biscuit in the other, staring out at the garden, with the heavy rain beating against the window, wishing there could be a short break from the persistent wet weather.

A couple of dry days will do, just to give me enough time to wander up to the allotment site and plant the garlic cloves that are still lurking in the dark and warmth of a paper bag.

Garlic needs a period of cold temperatures, so that when the individual planted clove matures and develops into a large bulb, the bulb splits into the individual cloves that make up the head of the garlic bulb, without a cold snap the developing garlic remains one big solid bulb.

I also need a dry spell to go and dig up some more leeks and pick a few Brussels sprouts to serve up on Christmas day.

I have already harvested the butternut squash, and used some of it to cook and freeze a Pumpkin and Carrot Cobbler for the vegetarian eaters in the family joining us on Christmas day.

There's nothing more satisfying than being able to collect produce off your plot with your own home grown vegetables and salad crops, no queuing at the supermarket, wandering up and down the aisles, trying to grab the last bag of carrots before someone else gets there before you, oh, and speaking of carrots, finally after much trial and error, ladies and gentlemen I feel a drum roll to be in order, in October my sister Cheryl and I pulled up a bunch of carrots with no forked roots, so ok, they are not going to win prizes in the giant carrot competition, or have Kevin the carrot from Aldi's Christmas advert losing sleep about being replaced in his job, but to us humble amateur carrot growers we are feeling very smug!!

As Shaking Stevens Christmas song comes to an end, I am contemplating whether or not, it is suitable to add a large bag of well rotted horse manure to my Christmas wish list, with second thoughts, perhaps not!

I will stick to the more appropriate, ankle length, sock lined Wellington boots, I spotted in a local garden centre, ideal for working on the plot after wet weather.

It's no mean feat to grow carrots full stop!

We have never managed to raise a crop on our plot but it has been done before when Keith went to elaborate ends by creating a deep trough and lining it with newspaper before well soaking that before planting different types of carrots with Chantilly ones growing lovely feathery tops. Well done – Lesley.

We have been successful growing potatoes, onions, peas, leeks, chard (very colourful), beetroot – makes lovely soup, parsnips – these did split unfortunately but we still got a good amount, turnips and my favourite -spinach –ugh! Still nicer than bought spinach mind you.

Fruits include red, white and Blackcurrants, loads of raspberries, rhubarb, grapes and loads of apples.

Failures have been the bean poles being battered down with one of the many Storms that we had, Spring onions never work well for us so we will grow them in our back garden next year along with some salad stuff. Perhaps if I sing to them, they may make an effort for me!

We have quite an orchard of apples as well as trees on individual plots. We have a cherry tree on our plot, which always promises to deliver a few berries but the birds always get there first. The tree isn't looking too good so will probably be removed next year.

The allotments are now being readied for the winter months with adding compost to enrich the ground, or for the planting of some veg. Lesley


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


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# **Tresillian Methodist Chapel**

As we had intended, our Conservator, Torquil McNeigle, with his team, started work last week on the south transept monuments. The photo shows the main slate memorial lifted clear of the wall for cleaning, prior to it being refixed at the correct height. The timber frame has been taken to Devon for repair. Work ceases this Friday, 15th September, after a cleaning operation, and the September service on 17th should go ahead as planned.

Further work is planned for early October, and we hope to carry on and complete the new floor in October.

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Coming from St Austell direction) From Probus Bypass, A390, heading west, turn off south (left) signposted Tresawles/St Michael Penkivel; first right St MPK turning and drive south 1.2 miles to join route from Truro which follows. (Coming from Truro direction) turn off A390 at Tresillian Bridge and follow signs for St Michael Penkivel; after 1 mile, turn right at tee junction (here routes join); after quarter mile take first left signed Lamorran and follow lane 1 mile (hills and double bends); turn right at tee junction, follow lane south, past Tregenna to Lamorran, ignoring all side turnings for St Michael Penkivel, Ruan Lanihorne and Tregony. Lamorran Church is on the righthand side, parking at roadside.
