

The Walking Group met at Charlestown, St Austell on Saturday, the 26th October outside the Shipwreck Museum.

One of the last times that the walkers looked around this area, we wandered back into a lane where we passed a chimneystack and building before continuing into a field, which had a very good lane for us to wander as far as we could before returning around the harbour.

Since then there has been major works to support the cliffs on the right hand side of the harbour looking out to sea.

This time, one of our walkers led us up the left side of the quay, which took us up to join the coastal path. We had a great turnout for our walk and a good time to catch up while enjoying the views.

I had never walked this side of the Coastal Footpath before because the path was rather set back. We could see that there was access to the beach below and one guy was trying to get into the sea but the wind was rather fresh to say the least. The sea was chucking up pebbles so we left him to it and continued on our way.



The Coastal footpath slowly climbs upwards over the fields and then connects with Sea Road, where the posh houses are found. We wandered over on the coastal path behind the houses with lovely views and joined Sea Road and up to the Port Avallon Hotel and restaurant before dropping down back towards the Coastguards view point and lookout. Some of us sat outside in the sunshine and others actually went in to view and talk to the coastguards on watch. Outside was a shed with used books for sale so we got one to take home with us.

St Austell Coastguard point is part of H.M Coastguard and its volunteers who respond to coastal & maritime emergencies. The next coastguard lookout is at Carlyon Bay.

The planters have all been painted and the Memorial Garden tidied for the Remembrance Sunday service, which, luckily this year, was a dry and sunny day.




Keith maintains the extensive physical printed archive and also the now digital only archive going forward.

When we first had a decorated Christmas Tree in the village in 1969 it brought compliments from people not only in the village but from further afield.

We are pleased to say that we will be having a tree again this year. Not only does the tree present a very pleasing sight but it also forms the motivation for an evening of Carol Singing.

This, apart from being yet another opportunity for getting together and celebrating the Christmas season, raises a rewarding amount for charity.

In 1969 a sum of £11.7.0d. (we used British money in those days – remember?) was added to a collection made by the ladies of the W.I. and was shared between the Save the Children Fund and the Society for Research into Muscular Dystrophy.

Under a similar arrangement in 1970 our carol singers raised £13.8.0d. for the West Cornwall Society for the Mentally Handicapped.

This year the benefitting charity will be the Friends of Truro Hospitals, who are endeavouring to provide an Electro-Encephalograph machine, which will greatly assist the mentally handicapped. of the county.

The Carol Service will begin at the tree at 7.0 p.m. on Tuesday 21st. December

Probus Male Voice Choir have again been kind enough to lead in the singing. We plan to then walk to Fairfax Road, returning through the village to the Polsue Way estate and then down to Manor Cottage.

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BIRDS EYE VIEW – by Andrew Nicholson

A lot of the birds that are regulars on the Tresillian River actually leave in the spring to breed elsewhere before gradually returning from mid-summer onwards and into the autumn. Autumn is often the time too, when more unusual migrant birds can sometimes be seen stopping off briefly on the river as they passing through. There wasn't too much unexpected in the first part of the autumn this year, but this changed heading into late October and early November.

Very welcome visitors were a pair of Whooper Swans, who dropped in on the 27th October and were present for a couple of weeks, often seen opposite Tresemple Pool. These were only the second sighting of Whooper Swans on the Tresillian River this century, the first ones being a pair that were present for a few days a little further down the river at St Clement in April 2021, at the time when some lockdown restrictions were still in place. These swans are birds of the far north, breeding predominantly in Iceland before many head south for the winter. They are very similar in size to our own Mute Swan, but have a distinctive yellow and black beak rather than the Mute Swan's orange and black beak.

Hot on the heels of the Whooper Swans was the visit of a Pink Footed Goose in early November. This one liked hanging out amongst the very substantial flock of Canada Geese on the river. These are also birds of the Arctic, breeding in Greenland and Iceland, with significant numbers over wintering in different parts of the British Isles, particularly Scotland, Ireland and Norfolk.

Trips down to Cornwall are a lot less common, but several Pink Footed Geese have been reported across the county this autumn. This was our first visitor on the Tresillian River since spring 2000 where one was seen several weeks at the start of the first lockdown, sometimes right next to the Fal garage!

A real surprise was the sighting of a Common Scoter, also in November. This is a duck species normally seen out on the open sea, although an unusually obliging one was present at Swanpool lake in Falmouth for a couple of weeks some years ago. This one was near St Clement, but disappointingly, didn't hang around for long and was only seen by a couple of observers (sadly I was not amongst them!). Sometimes you just need to be in the right place at exactly the right time!

As we enter into winter, although the days are short, there are plenty of birds to be seen along the river. There are good numbers of wading birds and ducks, and if you are patient, why not try and spot a Kingfisher? You can often see one at Tresemple Pool, but you can also sometimes see one right in Tresillian. The other day I was watching one from the verge of the main road, repeatedly hovering like a miniature blue Kestrel before diving into the river.

Now that's a sight that can brighten up even the dullest winter day.

Before we got very far, the whole exercise was put onto hold because of Covid and it wasn't until we got back into the pool in 2021. We joined the "Aspire Channel Swim 2021" and we came up with the name "WaterWings". We started with £100.00 and by the time we had completed the challenge, we had made £850 for the charity. We received a certificate, a medal and a haversack for our efforts.

While Sylvia was ill, we would swim and dedicate how many lengths we did on her behalf.

CORNISH SMITE CHAMPIONSHIP REVIEW – By Andrew Nicholson

The Cornish Smite Championship took place at Tresillian Playing Field on Sunday 22nd September. Heavy rain in the morning put the event in doubt, but thankfully, the rain stopped in the nick of time and the tournament was able to go ahead. For those of you who are still wondering what the game of Smite is all about – it's a version of skittles where a larger skittle or "Smiter" is thrown rather than a ball at the pins. Each pin in numbered 1-10 and if you knock down one pin, the value of the pin is scored, but if more than one pin is felled it's the number of pins knocked down that is scored.

Considering the weather, it was great to see an entry of sixteen pairs taking part (on a par with last year) and a good crowd of supporters to match. There were four groups in total where each team played each other, with the top two teams progressing through to the knock out stages - and the quarter finals; whilst the bottom two teams also progressed to the Consolation knock out.

Before the knock out part began, we paused the event to have a minute of applause for the very popular Sid Deeble who sadly passed away a few weeks before the event. Sid, from Trispen, was always a keen supporter of Smite and used to play in this event each year with his grandson, Dougal.

As the tournament progressed, the two remaining teams for the championship final were reigning World Champions - father and son team of Ryland and Jack Shepherd from Probus, taking on the teenage pair of Jospeh Nicholson and Carne Michel (from Tresillian and Trispen respectively).

Joseph and Carne had created a big shock in the semi-final knocking out 2022 Cornish and World Champions, Andrew and Isaac Nicholson. Isaac had just won the World Singles title for the second consecutive time a month previously in St. Neot, but this time his brother, Joseph and friend Carne were too strong, winning 2-0 after Joseph took out a great long shot on the ten pin to win the match.

Ryland and Jack came from 1-0 down in their own semi-final to beat Tim and Chloe 2-1, and they were favourites in the final to add the Cornish title to the World Doubles title they had won the previous month. But sport doesn't always follow the form guide! The first game was quite an edgy affair, but with the scores on 46-40, Carne took out the 4 pin to win the first leg 50-40. The second leg saw Joseph and Carne open up a sizeable lead as missed shots proved expensive for Ryland and Jack. However, the World Champions didn't lie down quietly and tried to force their way back into the match, separating a couple of key pins for their opponents with the scores on 48-34.

Could Joseph and Carne get the exact 2 pin score they needed to avoid going bust (if your score exceeds 50 exactly, your team has to go back to 25)? Carne cleverly managed to take out two different pins though to win the leg 50-34 knocking out their second World Champion pair in the process – well done Joseph and Carne – new Cornish Smite Champions! This victory seemed particularly appropriate as Carne was also one of Sid Deeble's grand children.

In the Consolation event, local pairing of Hannah and Ben Kernow won the final against Tammy and Darren 2-1 to keep the chocolates in Tresillian!. Thankfully, the weather stayed dry and all in all, it was a great afternoon of Smiting. With the entrance fees, together with the BBQ and cake sales over £200 was raised, split between the playing field and Compassion (the chapel sponsors a lad called Emmanuel in Uganda through Compassion and the money goes directly to help support him and his family).

Tresillian Allotment Association

As the days slowly shorten and the darker nights draw in, activity on the allotment site is also slowing down, the garlic bulbs have already been planted and apart from harvesting Kale, Brussels and Leeks as and when required, the allotmenteer spends increasingly more time indoors now than out.

But don't let them fool you, they may be curled up in a comfy chair, cuppa in hand, but their minds will be working overtime, thinking about the following year ahead. This is the ideal time for thinking and planning your plot out, and deciding what you want to grow on your plot next season.

My Sister and I, are for example deciding to move most of our fruit from one plot to another, the plot we are moving them to, has been used to grow vegetables and has over the years been enriched with manure making a nice depth of soil, doing this will then give us a chance to dig the old fruit bed over, weed it and add manure and compost to the beds. We will grow vegetables in this plot next year, which in turn will improve the soil structure.

The wonderful colourful seed packets ordered in October have arrived, bringing forth great expectations of the seasons ahead.

Never get obsessed with the sowing dates shown on the seed packets, these are for guidance only, use your own judgement according to the prevailing weather. It is better to be little late sowing the seed, than to rush and sow the seeds while the temperature is too cold.

Temperature is a key factor in getting seeds to germinate, and if it is too cold there is a high risk you will get no germination at all. Good quality compost is also essential for seed germination, you are better to buy a new smaller bag of good multi purpose compost or compost specifically formulated for seed sowing, or again the seed can fail.

The other essential ingredient for successful germination of seeds, is water, too much and the seeds will rot, not enough and the compost will dry out and the seeds will fail, getting the balance of watering right is not easy, especially now with the peat free composts, water the compost before you sow the seeds, so that the seed is pressed against damp compost, when you have sown the seeds, cover the surface with a sprinkling of compost or vermiculite, then use a freezer bag with tie handles to put the tray or small pot inside and tie up the handles, this makes an ideal cheap propagator, you can open up the bag if it looks like too much condensation is being produced and then close it up again to keep the moisture in, most seeds will germinate between 10 to 14 days.

Clean your garden tools, use a stiff brush to remove any soil, then wipe handles and blades with hot soapy water, dry thoroughly with a clean dry cloth, remove rust with steel wool and use a sharpening stone to give blades a nice sharp edge. Wipe metal parts with a lubricant like WD40 or vegetable oil and use linseed oil on wooden handles.

Between now and February is the ideal time to move dormant, deciduous shrubs.

Prepare the new planting hole before you dig up the shrub you wish to move, dig the new planting hole, then fork over the base to break up any compacted soil, remove any stones and weeds, then place some well rotted manure or fresh compost in the bottom of the hole.

When digging up the shrub try and take as big a root ball as you can, and replant immediately into the new planting hole, plant the shrub at the same depth as it was growing previously. Backfill with soil and firm in well to ensure good soil contact. Water it in well.

Spread a mulch of well-rotted horse manure or compost between herbaceous perennials and around trees and shrubs, this helps suppress weeds and aids soil structure.

Dead head winter bedding like pansies and cyclamen this will stop them forming seed, which will in turn keep them blooming longer.

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Tresillian Village Website - Contact from Australia

Back in October this year I published an item in the News section of the Tresillian Village website regarding an email enquiry I received via the website from Australia about a family history research project being undertaken by David Blake who lives in Brisbane, Australia.

His enquiry related to family history information left by his late mother regarding his grandfather, Ernest James Blake, who was born in Cornwall in 1880 subsequently emigrating to Australia with his parents in 1882. Following up on this information David managed to obtain documentation relating to his grandfather's baptism on 9th August 1880 which reveals a location of Ventonberron and that the baptism was likely carried out there by a travelling clergyman, perhaps from Probus, also listing his great grandfather as having the occupation of farm labourer. David's understanding is that the Ventonberron mentioned was a farm house, somewhere near Tresillian.

I replied to David saying that Venton Berron is the name of a cottage a short distance due north of the village of Tresillian, and that this may be related to the farm house he mentions. It was at this point that I thought it worth publishing an item on the Tresillian Village website in the hope that someone may come forward with information to assist him in his quest to find out more.

Within a short period of time after posting an item in the News section of the website I received a reply from Julie le Masurier who purchased Venton Berron cottage with her husband, saying that she would be happy to make contact with David and share what knowledge she has about the property. The following is a shortened version of the history of the property Julie related to David.

"According to Cornwall County Records, there is evidence of habitation on this site back in medieval times. Our water comes from a natural spring which is in records as a holy well, which has been in documents since 1265." [They occasionally have people visiting who like 'collecting' all the holy wells in Cornwall.]

"Venton, which is also sometimes spelt Fenton, means spring in Cornish. Venton and Fenton appear in different Cornish place names e.g. Ventongimps. Lots of places in Cornwall also have Perran in their name e.g. Perranporth, Perranwell, which is linked to St. Perran the patron saint of Cornwall. Perran also gets written different ways such as Berren and Berron, so Venton Berron means St. Perran's Well/Spring - and the records of the holy well do indeed refer to it being dedicated to St. Perran."

"The oldest parts of the current property were up until the 1960s two cottages, one called Venton Berron and one Trehane. Trehane was an estate and we adjoin the now neglected gardens where the ruined house in the article you shared still stands. The cottages had very thick cobb walls, and were farm workers cottages. The cottages used the holy well for their water, and there was a slate water trough to store it. That slate now being our hearth! Some brief investigations we did found a record of Venton Berron being rented out to a widow and her servant in the year 1700."

A big thank you to Julie for responding to help David in piecing together a part of his family history, and to David for reaching out on his voyage of discovery that has yielded yet more fascinating historical information about our location in Cornwall.


