We started 2025 by having a completely new heating system installed – boiler, radiators and pipes - which has made such a difference to the warmth of the Hall for our users. We are very grateful to Blue Flame for their brilliant workmanship.

We have submitted applications for more grants, as there is still a lot of work we need carrying out to bring the Hall up-to-date, bearing in mind that it is now 52 years old. However, we may not be so lucky this time and the work would then have to be put on hold, which would be a great shame. New internal fire doors have also been fitted to conform with the recommendations in the report we received from the Fire Inspector.

After all the work that has been carried out, the Hall is now desperately in need of redecoration and it is planned for this redecoration to take place in August, which is our quietest time for bookings and therefore less disruptive to our users.

It goes without saying that all the work that has been done over the last few months would not have been possible without the hard work and enthusiasm of our Management Committee team and I would like to pass on my extreme gratitude for everything they have done and the lengths to which they have gone to achieve successful outcomes.

Thanks must also go to our users who have coped cheerfully with the disruptions to their use of the Hall while the work has been carried out.

As you will see in the report from the Village Improvement Group, we are delighted to host an event to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of the war in Europe. This is a joint venture between the Village Improvement Group and the Tresillian Village Hall Management Committee and we are hoping you will all come along to enjoy this special afternoon on Monday 5 May at 2 p.m. Posters will be displayed around the village nearer the time.

Our thanks go to Helen Nicholson for all her assistance in the grant applications and also St Clement Parish Council for administering the Levelling Up grant.

Tresillian Walking Group

The walking group members were asked if they would like to wander through Falmouth by the seaside and then to continue back for fish and chips at the Harbour Lights on the 22nd of March, but unfortunately, most folk were engaged elsewhere so there were only four of us to managed the journey.

We agreed to meet up at the Princess Pavilions for a beverage and after wandering through the gardens and by the grotto we set off through the tunnel to the Seafront on Cliff Road. Parking was not a problem as we could park more or less opposite the Pavilions.

Because Peter was still getting over a knee operation, he and Margaret decided to walk up with us until the Falmouth Hotel before continuing into the town to wander around and to meet up at lunchtime.

Dave and I walked towards the point but I wanted to look at Pendennis Castle thinking of this for a family trip in the summer. We walked up to the castle for a quick natter with the volunteers outside and then wandered along the moat around the outside. The castle was originally built between 1540 – 42 by Henry VIII as an artillery Fort against the French and in Elizabethan times warded off the Spanish Armada along with St Mawes Castle, they both guarded Falmouth. After the Civil War, Charles II renovated Pendennis Castle and it was upgraded again in 1730 -1790 during the Napoleonic Wars.

We both knew that the Coast Guard Station looks over the point but we had never come across the Battery canons before from the war.

We continued on our way still on a high up path and then passed the Ships and Castles. This is being revamped as a community facility with the 25-metre pool open in September 2024.

We slowly dropped down towards the docks and spent a few moments watching what was going on at Pendennis Dockyard. A huge Sea Cat Dublin ferry was in the dock and if you look very carefully, you may be able to pick out the workers in yellow coats looking like dots underneath the ship.

On the dockside on the left, there was a great big metal tube being chewed to pieces by a crane with a huge Crab Claw. Really fascinating but it was time to meet up again for lunch and then back home.



Amy Cooper, Ceramicist,

In January and February, Amy Cooper, Ceramicist, held Ceramics Tiles days in the Chapel for people to come to design and draw their ideas in clay to express for them what makes Tresillian Village great.

Over 30+ people turned up from all over the place beside our villagers to take place in this project.

Amy provided 80 clay tiles for us to create our own ideas ranging from the Wheel Inn; the Allotments; geese and swans on the river and in flight; the viaduct; pets; Cornish Pasties etc. with the idea that the tiles would be dried in Amy's kiln and then returned for painting with coloured slips and glazes before drying once again.

On Friday 18th, some of us returned to place the tiles into different batches and eventually decided on two diamond shapes to eventually be placed on the wall around the of Mary's Pasty's shop/Ellis wall area. Amy started with a talk about the bare tiles and explained how to create a design for them. She also explained how they would be left to dry before going into a kiln. Afterwards, when all were returned, we could used slip or glazes to paint on the tiles before they went back going into the kiln to fix the glazes.



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A bit of a Fright!

On returning to the car after the weekly shop, I saw a large plane flying very low and circling on its way. I wondered if it was in difficulties but not so. As it went on its way, I thought no more about it but when we continued in the car, returning back towards Tresillian around by the Thatched Cottage, it was suddenly coming straight at us with its lights on and again very low (about 200 feet). Quite a scary moment!



My son later told me that it was a Dakoda DC-3 and that the plane was being used to finding sources of Lithium in Cornwall by photographing possible areas. In fact the Dakoda-3 turned out to be a Basler BT67 which is a turboprop-powered conversion of the Douglas DC-3 (or military C-47 Dakota).

Keith Littlejohns investigated the BELLGEOSPACE web pages and thought this should be of interest to any ex-miners as well as plane enthusiasts so here are photos of the plane and the maps showing the flight paths.

Dakota DC3 (1943) Aircraft carrying out Geological Mapping for Lithium in Cornwall

Back in 2021, BBC News reported about a low-flying 1940s plane being used for survey work, which would be a common sight over mid and west Cornwall during about two to three weeks.





The geological mapping plane was hopefully being used to identify where lithium and other minerals may be located underground. Morning flights were flown at about 100m (328ft) by two pilots on board.

Bell Geospace, responsible for the work, mentioned that the aircraft instruments were sensitive to measuring geological properties which cannot otherwise be seen".

The information gathered was to be use by companies hoping to evaluate potential for geothermal energy or lithium extraction, as well as to the British Geological Survey and the government. Data would be processed and later sold to clients, displaying what lies underground.

Field crew supervisor, Andrew Searle referred to the Dakota DC3 as a very stable platform and so can be flown low and slowly. He explained that by measuring the difference in the gravitational pull, then we can therefore mark the density changes in the subsurface."



Julianne Sharples, international marketing manager, said that they fly surveys all over the world: "There is a lot of interest in Cornwall, from companies looking to fuel the green transition, help the country get to net zero, and looking for geothermal resources."

In recent years, Cornwall has been found to contain "globally significant" amounts of high-grade lithium, a critical mineral for the production of batteries for electric vehicles, among other uses.

Granite beneath the surface also makes Cornwall suitable for geothermal energy exploration, with two projects already established at United Downs and the Eden Project, and with four more planned.

Farmers, horse owners and parish councils have been contacted in advance to warn them of possible disruption from the flights. The company said the plane would be much quieter than helicopters and other aircraft more commonly seen flying in Cornish skies. Engines have upward facing exhausts, so noise gets pushed upwards.

The company stated that noise was comparable to a car passing at 30 mph.

This additional information is supplied by Bell Geospace and was released prior to starting their current survey.

Bell Geospace, an Edinburgh-based airborne geophysicak surveying company, will be commencing operations in Cornwall this December [2024]

Bell Geospace are a UK based company with an office in Edinburgh, Scotland. Bell Geospace owns and operates three aircraft, which have been modified for geological mapping. The company has over twenty-five years experience in geophysical surveys and a wide variety of experience across many countries and conditions. There will be one aircraft (a Basler BT67) operating on the survey in Cornwall.

The survey is a continuation of work which started in December 2021. For around eight days of flying in December weather, it is estimated the survey will take two to three weeks. The survey will involve a plane flying in straight lines at an average height of 200 meters to collect geophysical information on the properties of rocks below the ground. The information being collected creates geological maps.

These maps may be used for planning geothermal resources in the area or by domestic mining companies tasked with future proofing the supply of critical minerals needed to build net zero economies.

Flights will take place during daylight hours, with take-off from Newquay airport just after sunrise. Flights typically last four and five hours. Parishes, farms and equine centres are being notified by mail and social media.

The airborne survey involves measuring minor variations in the Earth's gravitational field. Sensitive measuring equipment located in the aircraft will be used to gather this data. It is a totally passive technique which does not involve sending out any signals or sound waves.

Tresillian Allotment Association

In the gloomy month of January, I often use any rainy afternoons I have spare, to plan my allotment for the coming growing season, having found an old A3 graph book lurking in the office cupboard being unused, I commandeered it for plotting my allotment to scale, and have used it each year to plan where and what I am going to plant.

A bit extreme I hear you say, but believe me since adopting this method, the plot of ground I tend has benefited, it means I make sure the crops are rotated yearly around the plot and it also saves me time, instead of spending precious time walking up and down the plot deciding when I get to the allotment site where I will plant the plugs of vegetable plants I have grown, I can plan my visits to the plot more wisely, and know which part of the plot needs working on first to get the earlier crops in.

As is the want of all keen gardeners we are inclined when away from our plots to imagine that our spaces are larger and wider than they really are, and we can get carried away when in the garden centres, in buying enough flowers, seed potatoes, onion sets, seeds and plug plants that would in reality plant a whole acre of ground.

We visit gardens like Heligan where they have a lovely large walled garden to grow all the veggies and fruit they need to feed their staff and all their thousands of visitors.

In our heads we try to replicate this imagined paradise when choosing our own grow your own plants, only to discover that when back in the real world, we only need to feed a family of four and that there is only one gardener, "Moi" to work the space, or in my case myself and my sister as we share three plots.

I may get away with cramming herbaceous perennials in my own garden when I arrive home with my latest, must have plant from the garden centre, but edible crops are a bit more temperamental, as most are annual crops which need to grow quick and strongly to produce a crop and set seed all in one season. Edible crops to succeed, do need more space between their neighbours and space around each crop to cut down competition for nutrients and water.

For example courgettes need roughly a square metre of soil each to grow in, this enables them to perform well, and gives them room to grow into bigger, healthier plants which in turn will provide a greater harvest.

Using my graph book keeps my feet firmly on the ground, so instead of sowing 20 courgette seeds, I know realistically I can fit four healthy young courgette plants comfortably on my plot in the space allocated to them, I might sow two or three extra seeds, for just in case losses, but the rest stay safely wrapped up in their packet to be used next year.

The allotment plots on the Tresillian site are smaller than average size allotments, it is a small site in comparison to some allotment sites and has 30 individual plots. The majority of the plots measure approx 10 metres by 5 metres, we also have a few half plots measuring 5 metres by 5 metres. Plot holders can rent more than one plot if there are vacant plots available.


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




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Tresillian Methodist Chapel


