There are two NHS defibrillators in the village; One on the wall between Mary's Pasty Shop and the Petrol Station and one at the Methodist Chapel. Instructions for releasing them are on a plaque beside the defibrillators, and when in use clear audio instructions are given to you by the machine.

Telephone 999 first to report the incident, then follow instructions to release and use the equipment.

In memory of Philip Buddell, who was the lead person to bring defibrillator equipment to our village.

Ed's Ramblings

Wow, what a hot few days and nights we have had over August. Everything has suffered in our garden but some flowers have coped. We have a large Gunnera plant that has fainted away and our Agapanthus have not lasted but both will survive next year with a bit of luck next year.

The Agapanthus came about because a lady wanted rid of hers and advertised it in the Falmouth Packet. My stepson offered to pick it up for me but hadn't realised how big it was and no mentioned of size had cropped up! Rob brought it over on his trailer and we cut it up into three lots. Agapanthus roots like to be contained, so we potted two of them in the largest pots available. And buried the rest in our front garden. One pot withered and died and the second pot kept going for a bit but the buried plant has been fantastic in the ground. The majority of flowers are blue but I bought some white ones from the Range and hopefully they will grow again next year.

I first saw them at St Mawes Castle years ago and couldn't get over how large the flower heads grow. Mine at home are a lot smaller but I usually get a standard crop of about 19 blooms. This time I got 29!

In our car parking area, I noticed that there was a lot of what seemed to be black grapes on our but these had fallen from our Cherry Laurel tree. I think that their fruits are poisonous but they soon disappeared by courtesy of the birds and maybe squirrels as well? Again, this was something that I had never noticed before.

Dave and I are trying to keep fit by walking as much as possible, so on Bank Holiday Monday, (the hottest day), we decided to wander along by the river and then climbed down the big field towards Malpas to catch up with family over there.

We took water with us and wore hats and sun cream and managed to walk in quite a lot of shade but stopped by the pools so that we could see lots of little fishes in the weeds and then larger fish flashing silver a little further out. I couldn't make out what fish they were but later on as we walked by the toilets at St Clement, we talked to the farmer and his wife both busy gardening and I mentioned the fish. They may have been small Bream.

They also told us that we could walk up the hill towards Malpas but four days previously, the fire brigade were fighting a deep area underground in the fields and no one was allowed over the walk. We did see the fire chief in his car and also the fire brigade further on the skyline as they were making sure the fire was out. We finally got to Malpas and enjoyed looking over the view to the heronry opposite as we quaffed cold drinks before setting off back home later.

Tresillian Allotment Association

Autumn is approaching fast, after months of dry hot weather, accompanied by often strong drying winds, the rain finally came with a vengeance, but you won't hear a grumble or complaint from any keen gardener, the rain was a refreshing welcome.

Watching and hearing on the local and main news channels about the struggles farmers were having with the drought, I feel that surprisingly, crops on the allotment have done well, so ok the peas went over quickly as they like a bit cooler conditions, but not before we got a reasonable picking of pods before they rapidly set seed, and the climbing French beans didn't seem to want to scramble up the bamboo canes, instead curling themselves around the bottom of the canes and going around in circles, but we have had a great crop, not so easy to find and pick the beans and sometimes a bit of the old Sherlock Holmes was called for, but all in all a successful crop, the runner beans are still going strong and are climbing up their bamboo canes just as they should.

As for the potato crop, we had a pleasant surprise, as to be honest, when we planted the seed potatoes, we sprinkled some pelleted chicken manure and a handful of Vitax 6X in the trench, planted the chitted tubers and mounded the soil on top, and left them to fend for themselves, so we were not expecting great things especially with the dry weather, but I have to boast that this year is the best we have had, bigger potatoes and a better yield per seed potato planted.

If anyone has wandered up to the allotment site this summer and looked over the gate, you would have seen a wonderful display of summer bedding plants brightening up the site.

A big thank you to Keith & Barbara Littlejohns for planting out five large troughs, and placing and fixing the troughs on the railings down the ramp, not an easy task.

The apple trees in the allotment orchard have also gone into overdrive and are full of tasty eating and cooking apples, the orchard has been planted with a mixture of different varieties of apple, plus, several allotment holders have

Lesley [Ed.] hear, I can agree wholehearted with Lorraine's words about how different the hot days, rainstorms and windy weather has altered how everything has grown this year on our allotments and how lovely the flowering plants have helped the bees. Lots of sweetpeas and other flowering plants and veg have surpassed themselves.

Our onions have been lifted and left to dry before collecting and leaving in our greenhouse upside down between a slatted bench, which enabled any liquid could drip out. These are now dried out and still sitting upside down in bags in a dark part of our garage.

We lifted all of our potatoes and they have been quite wonderful. There will be lots of baked spuds as well as some small salad spuds as this is the first time we have successfully grown second earlies. We also planted first earlies as usual but these potatoes fell rapidly if I didn't keep a close eye on them when cooking.

Walking around the allotments showed how many allotmenteers had grown tomatoes on their plots and in their greenhouse at home, we have also grown loads of them along with cucumbers. Lots of tomato soups etc. have been consumed.

Tomato Soup

Ingredients

- 2 table spoons olive oil
- 2 onions chopped finely
- 1 carrot peeled and diced finely
- 1 garlic clove crushed (garlic salts)
- 1 celery stick finely chopped (I cheated and used celery salt) 1 lb Fresh Tomatoes halved
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 3/4 pints vegetable stock Handful of fresh Basil (Shredded)Salt and pepper to taste

Method

- 1. Heat oil in a large saucepan, add onions, carrots, garlic and celery, cover and cook for 10 minutes until soft.
- 2. Add tomatoes and sugar. Season with salt and pepper stir and cook for another 5 Minutes.
- 3. Add Stock, bring to the boil and simmer for 10 minutes
- 4. Liquidise until smooth and add basil.


I made this soup making sure that the cooking times were the same but then poured everything into my soup kettle. One of the best buys I have ever made.


Throughout the lovely weather we have been experiencing this summer, the boat, planters and window boxes have looked so colourful thanks to the care of our volunteers who carry out weeding and watering to ensure the blooms stay fresh for everyone to enjoy. Whilst the shrubbery at the eastern end of the village doesn't require watering as the shrubs are now well-established, it does need a great deal of work by one of our volunteers to keep it weed free and the shrubs regularly pruned.

When the road through the village was widened in the early 1960's, two seating areas were created on the river bank below road level to enable people to sit and enjoy the view out of sight of the road. 



Recollections of "Shamrock"

(Originally published in TRAM No. 10, March 1974)

A recent report in the "West Briton" mentioned the efforts of marine, historical and other bodies to discuss plans for the saving and restoration of the last vessel to trade under sail in the West Country. The 30 ton Tamar built ketch-rigged barge Shamrock was built at Stonehouse, Plymouth in 1899. All her life was spent mainly carrying loads of stone for road making to the little ports around the coasts of Devon and Cornwall and now she is beached in a Plymouth backwater.

She was a frequent visitor to Tresillian, bringing loads of crushed stone for the tar macadam plant which stood in the old Council Yard opposite Manor Cottage. The plant was moved some time after the last war as a result of petitions from the villagers.

Things came to a head when Mr Hawken Rowse, then a County Councillor and now Chairman of the new County Council, built a float to go in one of the Tresillian Carnival processions. The float was a model of the tar macadam plant labelled "The Monster" and as it went along it belched forth clouds of smoke and dust, being stoked by Hawken Rowse crouched under the model. At that time his parents lived at Manor Cottage and every time the tar macadam plant was lit up clouds of smoke and dust were blown along by the prevailing winds as far as Bunt's Garage. Life must have been rather difficult at Manor Cottage on "tarmac days".

I have many recollections of watching Shamrock coming up the river at high tide, her sails furled and a little engine "put-putting" away as she navigated the bends of the river. She was usually met at Malpas by Stan Jewell a council yard employee with a row boat far older than himself, he would row down to Malpas, hitch his boat up at Shamrock's transom, and act as pilot to Tresillian.

Sometimes the tide wasn't just right and Shamrock would tie up on the mud for a few hours until she was able to get to the quay at the Council Yard. Once tied up planks would be laid across to act as a gangway and the stone unloaded from the hold with a basket and a winch rope into barrows which were then wheeled to the stone dump. After unloading, her decks were brushed down, the hold battened down, and as soon as the water rose she set off again for the Plymouth quarries.

There often seemed to be a dog as part of the crew, generally sitting up near the bow to act as a lookout.

Shamrock was the last of her breed, the last of a long line of coasting ketches that brought an enormous amount of goods up the creeks and rivers of the West Country. They brought coal, timber, limestone, manure, fertiliser, grain and building materials to Tresillian but the trade began to fall away once the railway had established its many branch lines and goods stations.

I remember a rail journey some years ago, it must have been just after the last war and the coach was one of the old fashioned ones with framed photographs of beauty spots in Cornwall. One of those photographs was of Looe about 1900. Ladies in flowered hats and bustles, escorted by gentlemen in striped blazers and caps, were viewing the harbour at Looe crowded with little coasting ketches and fishing luggers. Right in the middle of the scene was Shamrock, gleaming with new paint, her masts still the original length, her decks neat and tidy.

I wish she were coming up the river tomorrow.


